FEBRUARY 1947 ENTERING CLASS

A limited number of Veterans and Non-Veterans will be admitted to the three college departments of Suffolk University on February 3, 1947, with the privilege of completing the first year work by September 5th, 1947.

—*Regular First Semester Program, Feb. 3 - May 31, 1947*

—*Regular Second Semester Program, June 9 - Sept. 5, 1947*

Students successfully completing the above programs will be eligible to enter second year classes on September 22, 1947.

SCHOOL HOME

Suffolk University owns and occupies a splendid fireproof building capable of seating at one time a maximum of three thousand students. Since the University operates on a three platoon system — morning, afternoon and evening classes — it is possible to accommodate large numbers without overcrowding. The University Building, moreover, was completed in 1938 at a cost of approximately one million dollars and is equipped with the latest in classroom furniture and equipment (now unobtainable due to post-war conditions.).

VETERAN QUOTA

Because the veteran quota in the September 1946 registration was very large, it is desired that Non-Veterans have a greater share of opportunity in February 1947. February registration will be limited to 500 applicants, and only such veterans as have applied seasonably will be admitted. Much paper work and personal conferences are involved in veteran registrations.

NO DORMITORIES AT SUFFOLK UNIVERSITY

Suffolk University does not provide dormitories or living accommodations for its students. It is distinctly an urban University, patronized by young men and women who live, temporarily at least, in Boston, or who commute daily to attend morning, afternoon or evening classes at Suffolk.

HOURS OF CLASSES

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Beginning students carrying the full program, will meet in two sessions (1:30 to 2:45 and 2:55 to 4:10) on five days a week. Thus they will be able to complete 30 semester hours of college credits between February 3rd and September 5th, 1947.
