Davis Educational Foundation Awards New Student Center Project \$100,000 Grant

Suffolk University's rapidly emerging student recreation center has assumed a commanding presence on Cambridge Street. Construction of the project is scheduled for completion by January 1991.

The new student recreation center received a tremendous boost from the Davis Educational Foundation which awarded the University a \$100,000 grant to defray construction costs for the \$10 million project.

Prior to awarding the grant, Trustees of the Davis Educational Foundation, Mr. Stanton W. Davis and Mrs. Anne Tenbrook, toured the University and visited the Ridgeway building site.

The Davis Foundation, established by Stanton Davis, the former President and Chairman of Shaw's Supermarkets, supports institutions of higher learning throughout New England.

Recently the University's Building Committee, headed by Trustee John M. Corcoran, inspected the fully enclosed facility. The bulk of the work remaining on the project centers on the interior of the building. University officials are confident the building will be in full use as early as the Spring 1991.

1990-91 ANNUAL FUND LAUNCHED

PHONATHON GOAL: REACH 25,000 ALUMNI

More than 160 Suffolk University Annual Fund volunteers and students joined forces aboard the "Spirit of Boston" and in a festive mood confidently launched the 1990-91 Annual Fund.


Several volunteers were honored for their past performance. Among those cited were Lesa Stramondo, JD 87, Wayne Gallo, JD 89, Cheryl Delaney, BA 89, and William Fonte, BA83. Under the leadership of Gail Mansfield, director of the University's Annual Fund Program, phonathon activity has increased significantly and with solid results. Last year, nearly 12,000 alumni were contacted by alumni and student volunteers whose efforts generated gifts and pledges totalling \$279,500.

The 1990-91 Annual Fund goal is \$290,000. Mansfield expects volunteers and student callers, which now number 200, to contact 25,000 alumni during the fall (September to December) and spring phonathons. This year a new day caller program manned by students will augment evening phonathon sessions.

Phonathons are held Monday through Thursday nights at 6:00 p.m. in the Alumni Phonathon Room on the 25th floor of Suffolk's One Beacon Street Office. To join this energetic group of volunteers and student callers, contact Gail Mansfield at 573-8452 or stop by. Volunteers are always welcome.

STUDENTS CELEBRATE 1st ANNIVERSARY OF DERNE STREET BUILDING OPENING

Commemorating the September 1989 opening of 28 Derne Street, student leaders representing the organizations located in the renovated activities center held a birthday celebration complete with ribbon cutting, cake and balloons.

SGA President Lisa Masciarelli and EDSA President Gail Mansfield hosted the noontime gathering under the direction of Donna Schmidt, director of student activities, and Marjorie Hewitt, assistant director of student activities. The celebration included tours of the banner draped building, an oversized birthday cake, and the usual hum of student activity that characterizes Derne St. With thirty-seven different clubs and organizations calling the building home, the facility is constantly in use by its population of lively Suffolk students.

Derne Street's beautiful and well planned \$2.7 million restoration included many small to mid-size rooms which are perfectly suited to the needs of the student club members. Despite its stepped entrance, Derne is fully accessible (via the adjacent John E. Fenton Building) and is equipped with a specially designed handicap chair lift.

SAWYER LIBRARY RESOURCES ENHANCED

The Mildred F. Sawyer Library, serving the University's College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the School of Management, has recently received three noteworthy gifts.

Ralph C. Ferragamo, a 1964 graduate of the College and the former publisher of J.A. Micropublishing, has made a leadership commitment to the library in honor of his parents, Christopher and Agnes Ferragamo. Ferragamo's gift is for unrestricted library use.

The Library's political science and international studies collection has received a

gift of \$23,000 for the purchase of books on international government relations. This generous support is the result of a bequest by the late Chase Kimball. Professor Kimball, a former government department faculty member, created a residuary unitrust during his lifetime which bequeathed one share of his estate to the University.

In acknowledging these gifts, Ted Hamann, director of the library, cited the continuing assistance of the Sawyer Charitable Foundation, which also provides unrestricted funds for the facility named in honor of Mildred F. Sawyer.

FALL SEMESTER ENROLLMENT UP

Unlike a number of its neighboring institutions, Suffolk University's enrollment is up for the fall semester with a total of 5,733 students enrolled in all of its divisions, up from last years 5,551.

The undergraduate increase was pegged at about 2% while graduate admissions increase by about 11% according to Michael Rubino, director of institutional research.

2,883 undergraduates are enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the School of Management; graduate students number 1,110. Law School enrollment is 1,740 and students represent 300 colleges and universities from 36 states and several foreign countries. The Law School and CLAS host 61% of the total student body. The remaining 39% of Suffolk's students are enrolled in the School of Management.

For the fall 1990 term, 30% of all undergraduates (freshman and transfer students) enrolled are minorities. Hispanic students account for 58% of this group; African-Americans comprise 38% and Asian students 31%.

POPULAR STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS BENEFIT FROM FOUNDATION SUPPORT

University sponsored financial aid programs have recently received foundation grants which help to promote Suffolk's mission - access and opportunity.

Currently 60% of Suffolk's full-time undergraduate students receive some form of financial aid.

A \$75,000 gift from the Mabel A. Horne Trust of the Bank of Boston Charitable Trusts will strengthen three of Suffolk's diverse scholarship programs, the Maria Stewart Minority Scholarhip Program, the President's Incentive Loan Program [PILP] and the Thomas Fulham Merit Scholarship Program.

In awarding the grant, Sharon Driscoll, executive account manager for the Bank of Boston Charitable Trust Committee, noted that the Horne Trust views Suffolk as an institution clearly focused on serving students from its community. In addition, the Polaroid Foundation supported the Stewart Program through a \$2,500 grant.

The President's Incentive Loan Program, an innovative approach to student support, awards loans which convert to outright grants upon graduation. PILP retention rates average 90% and the present default rate on repayment of loans is zero. In light of this, the Eleanor Naylor Dana Foundation of New York contributed \$50,000 to Suffolk to enhance the program.
