HISTORY OF SUFFOLK UNIVERSITY

The Law School, the first unit of the University, was established in September, 1906, to provide professional training for ambitious young men and women of moderate means. In 1914 the school was chartered with degree-granting powers by the Legislature of Massachusetts.

Educational facilities have been expanded in the belief that training in the liberal arts and sciences is an integral part of a balanced education. The College of Liberal Arts was founded in 1934, the Graduate School of Law in 1935, the College of Journalism in 1936, and the College of Business Administration in 1937. The various departments were incorporated by the Massachusetts Legislature in 1937.

Physical growth of the University was accompanied by professional recognition: Suffolk is a member of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and of the Association of American Colleges. The College Departments are approved by the Board of Collegiate Authority, Department of Education, Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The Law School is approved by the American Bar Association. The Veterans Administration approves all courses for GI benefits.

Located on Beacon Hill, directly behind the State House, near the building housing the Supreme Judicial, Superior, Probate, Land and Municipal Courts, Suffolk University provides excellent accommodations for educational work. In the University building are the Administrative offices, University Library, classrooms, completely equipped and

modern laboratories for biology, chemistry, geology and physics, University Auditorium, Bookstore, and student lounges.

Although the physical equipment of a university is important, the quality of its educational program is even more significant. The true measure of a university is reflected in the record of its graduates. Early in its history, Suffolk University gained recognition for the quality of its Faculty and the success of its graduates. Judges, lawyers, bankers, businessmen, educators, and leaders in civic and political life owe their advancement to the quality of training received at Suffolk University.

THE LAW LIBRARY

The Law Library, containing over twenty-five thousand volumes, is located on the third floor of the University and is part of the University Library. By yearly appropriations and gifts from Alumni and others it is constantly increasing its collection.

The Library includes all of the reported decisions of all the states, in the National Reporter System, and all of the official reports of many of the states; reports of all the decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States and other Federal courts; reports of selected Federal Administrative Agencies; the American Digest; Corpus Juris and Corpus Juris Scundum; American Jurisprudence and American Law Reports. It contains a full set of English reports and a large collection of legal periodicals, text-books and casebooks.

With regard to statutory material, the Library has the United States Statutes at Large, the United States Code Annotated, all the compilations of the Massachusetts statutes, the Annotated Laws of Massachusetts, the Massachusetts General Laws Annotated, the statutes of the New England and other selected states.

The Law Library is open from 9:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. Monday through Friday, and 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Saturday.

The Massachusetts State Library, a collection of 600,000 volumes, containing many state papers, legislative materials, and other legal research aids, is housed in the State House and easily accessible to law students.

Also available for student use is the Public Library of the City of Boston. This library is one of the largest in the world, containing about two million volumes.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

The method of instruction in Suffolk University Law School combines the study of cases and texts with lectures designed to develop legal reasoning and a knowledge of principles and rules.

Competent practice of law requires an ability to analyze and marshal complicated fact situations, as well as a knowledge of legal principles and a trained power of legal reasoning. Successful study of law depends upon the power of the student to acquire the skilled lawyer's mode of thought — the legal mind.

Students will be aided so far as possible to develop lawyer-like ability in analysis, reasoning and expression, and to acquire an integrated understanding of related fields of law. Problems are assigned to all students for training in legal thought, research and writing. Whenever practicable, classes are taught on a seminar basis, in small groups with individual discussion and writing.

MOOT COURT

This course, required of all students, was established with the view to affording experience in pleading, practice and trial, in the belief that the law student should begin his practical experience in the law school and not encounter it for the first time after he has been admitted to the Bar.

The Court System consists of four Courts, the Supreme Judicial Court, the Superior Court, a Probate Court and a District Court. The jurisdiction of these Courts is based upon that of the like Courts of Massachusetts. Each of the Courts has a student Clerk.

Practice in these Courts is conducted strictly in accordance with the law and rules of courts of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Handling of cases in the various courts gives the student a working knowledge of court procedure and develops in him a sense of professional responsibility.

Student counsel draw their own writs and other process, have them served by the Moot Court Sheriff, and return them to the Clerk's Office, as required by the statutes and rules of courts of the Commonwealth. Each counsel drafts and files his own pleadings and other papers at or within the times fixed by law. Failure to do so entails the consequences which would follow such failure in actual litigation. Counsel for the parties act independently of each other in the preparation of pleadings and of the case for trial.

The student is encouraged to make his experience as extensive as possible by filing, when proper, demurrers, motions to dismiss, pleas, special answers, notices to admit facts, interrogatories, affidavits of no cause of action or of no defense, motions for directed verdicts, requests for instructions, motions for new trials, appeals, bills of exceptions and reports. Sessions of the Courts are held for interlocutory matters. Actual trials are held before juries impaneled from the student body or in sessions without jury.

In all respects, the effort is to approximate as nearly as possible the experience which the young lawyer will have in his first years at the Bar whether practicing by himself or as a Junior in a law office.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Outstanding students participate in legal internship in the office of the Middlesex County District Attorney, where the program was initiated in this region, and also in the office of the Attorney General of Massachusetts. Others gain practical experience through clerkships in leading law offices.

Student activities sponsored by the University are open to qualified students in the Law School. Maintenance of a satisfactory scholastic standard is a prerequisite for participation in such activities.

The Wig and Robe Society is a private organization in which all male students in the Law School are eligible for membership. It maintains club rooms in close proximity to the School in which it has the reports of the Supreme Judicial Court of the Commonwealth, the Federal Reports, Corpus Juris, text books and other legal material available to its membership. Guest lecturers are procured to speak on problems of the law. It is an aim of the Society to foster a closer unity between students, Faculty and alumni.

SCHOLARSHIPS

SUFFOLK UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

The **Trustees of the University** have established four full scholarships to be awarded annually to entering first year students who are graduates of Suffolk University who have maintained high scholastic standing in their college work. These scholarships are awarded and continued in the discretion of the Faculty Administrative Committee of the Law School.

TRUSTEES' SCHOLARSHIPS

The Trustees of the University have established the following full scholarships.

The **David I. Walsh Scholarships** in memory of the late Senator David I. Walsh of Massachusetts, to be awarded annually to a graduate of the College of the Holy Cross.

The **Louis D. Brandeis Scholarships** in memory of the late Justice Louis D. Brandeis of the United States Supreme Court, to be awarded annually to a graduate of Brandeis University.

The **Charles Doe Scholarships** in memory of Charles Doe, a graduate of Dartmouth College in the class of 1849, Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court of New Hampshire for thirty-five years and Chief Justice for twenty years, to be awarded annually to a graduate of Dartmouth College.

The **Merrimack College Scholarships**, to be awarded annually to a graduate of Merrimack College.

Each of the above Trustees' Scholarships, covering full tuition and fees, is available annually to a student who is worthy and desirous of studying law at Suffolk University Law School, upon nomination by the President of each of the aforementioned institutions. Each recipient will receive the scholarship for one year, and if he maintains a satisfactory average in the Law School, the scholarship will continue until he receives his degree.

The **William F. A. Graham Scholarship**, established by the Trustees in memory of the late William F. A. Graham, Esq., of the class of 1924, long a Trustee of Suffolk University, covering full tuition and fees, is to be awarded annually by the Faculty to a student who typifies the high ideals exemplified by the life of Mr. Graham.

ALUMNI FUND SCHOLARSHIPS

The **Suffolk University Law School Alumni Association** finances by contributions to the Alumni Fund many scholarships which are awarded each year to upperclass students on the basis of scholarship, character and need. During the past academic year thirty-two students received such scholarships covering all or part of the annual tuition fee.

A limited number of these scholarships are also available to outstanding applicants for admission to the Law School.

STEINBERG SCHOLARSHIP

The **Steinberg Scholarship**, established by Louis H. Steinberg of the Class of 1925, consists of the income of 60 shares of U.S. Steel Corporation stock and 120 shares of Bethlehem Steel Corporation stock and is awarded annually to that senior in the evening division of the school who has the highest average for the three preceding years.

FAIRCHILD SCHOLARSHIP

The **Fairchild Scholarship**, established in 1926 by Mrs. Julian D. Fairchild of Brooklyn, N. Y., in memory of her late husband, yields an income of \$100 a year, and is awarded to some member of the freshman class on the basis of scholarship, character and need.

AWARDS

The **Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation of Richmond, Virginia**, has established an annual award of \$100. to the graduating student, in either the day or evening division, who has attained the highest weighted average in Real Property subjects.

The **Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Company** has established annual awards of separately bound volumes of the material in American Jurisprudence on the following subjects, to be awarded to the highest ranking students in the courses related thereto:

LOAN FUNDS

The **Bar Association of Norfolk County Student Loan Fund**, in the amount of \$1,000.00, the first to be set up in this region by a Bar Association, was established in 1958 to assist promising students of limited means, with preference to be given to residents of Norfolk County.

This Fund is in addition to other loan funds available to all students of the University.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Suffolk University Law School accepts as regular students only applicants who have satisfactorily completed at least three-quarters of the credits acceptable for a bachelor's degree from an approved college or university. This complies with the prelegal college educational requirements of the American Bar Association.

A limited number of applicants whose experience and achievement, in the judgment of the Faculty, have qualified them for the study of law despite a lack of sufficient collegiate credits, may be admitted as special students.

Applicants who do not meet the foregoing requirements may consult the Registrar of Suffolk University for a program of day or evening studies which will prepare them for admission to the Law School.

Applicants who may desire to practice law elsewhere than in Massachusetts are advised to inquire of the secretary of the Board of Bar Examiners of such other jurisdiction to determine their eligibility, and to insure their completion of all local requirements. Some states now require such procedures as Law Student Registration, the filing of a Law Student's Qualifying Certificate, and other formalities *before* the applicant begins the study of law, under the rules for admission to the local bar.

RECOMMENDED PRELEGAL STUDY

Our students come from many universities, of varied curricula. The Faculty does not specify particular subjects for prelegal education. However, the prospective law student is advised that college studies in the liberal arts are preferred over those found in narrow and specialized vocational training courses.

Concentration in one or more of the usual fields of arts and sciences such as history, government, philosophy, mathematics, economics and the humanities is most desirable. Undergraduate courses in accounting are recommended inasmuch as the Law School has recently instituted a course in Legal Accounting which is required of all students whose college transcripts do not include credits for a minimum of one year of accounting.

The importance of proficiency in English, both written and spoken, cannot be overemphasized.

COMBINED DEGREE PROGRAM

A student who, through study in one of the Colleges of Suffolk University, has earned three-quarters of the credits required for a Bachelor's degree may be eligible to follow the program set forth in the Suffolk University College Bulletin, under which he may receive his college degree upon satisfactory completion of the first year Law School subjects as listed in the three year course, whether such courses are taken in the day or evening division. Inquiries concerning eligibility for this program should be directed to the Dean of the University.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Application for admission must be made on the form provided therefor, which may be obtained from the Registrar. If the applicant has not previously attended Suffolk University, the application must be accompanied by an Application Fee of \$10.00, which is not refundable.

The applicant must request the Registrars of all colleges and graduate or professional schools previously attended to forward official transcripts of his records directly to the Registrar of Suffolk University Law School.

The applicant must also arrange to have letters of opinion concerning his character, intelligence, industry and aptitude for the study of law sent directly to the Registrar by two responsible persons not related to the applicant.

If a period of time other than that of a usual academic vacation has intervened between the last attendance at an educational institution and the application for admission, the applicant must also furnish to the Registrar a statement in writing describing his occupation or other activity during that interim.

All applications are voted on by the Faculty Administrative Committee. Notification of the action taken will be sent by mail to the applicant at the address given on the application unless otherwise requested in writing.

REGISTRATION

Registration is accomplished as far as possible by mail prior to the commencement of classes. Registration forms will be mailed to applicants who are accepted.

A student who requires a special program of courses should make an appointment for a personal interview with the Registrar well in advance of the opening of the semester.

LEGAL APTITUDE TEST

Applicants for admission to Suffolk University Law School are advised, but not required, to take the Law School admission test conducted by the Educational Testing Service of New Jersey. This test is conducted several times annually in the major cities of the United States. For information and application form write the Educational Testing Service, Post Office Box 592, Princeton, New Jersey. Examinees should request that the results of the test be forwarded to Suffolk University Law School.

ADVANCED STANDING

Advanced standing for the degree of Bachelor of Laws may be granted for courses successfully completed in approved law schools in the discretion of the Faculty Administrative Committee.

In any event the right is reserved to refuse such credit, or to allow it only upon condition or after examination.

DAY AND EVENING DIVISIONS

FULL-TIME STUDY

Courses for the degree of Bachelor of Laws in Suffolk University Law School are offered in day and evening divisions. The regular course in the day division consists of three academic years of full-time study of law. Under the Regulations of the School,¹ the standards of the American Bar Association,² and Rules of the Board of Bar Examiners³ of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, only those students who can devote *substantially all of their working time* to the study of law are eligible to enroll in the full time day division and complete their law course in three school years or six semesters.

PART-TIME STUDY

Students who cannot devote substantially all of their working time to the study of law may enroll in the evening division and complete their work for the degree in four school years or eight semesters, or may take a special program of part-time study in the day division.

The basic subjects in the day and evening divisions are the same. Students in both divisions are held to the same academic standards.

COMMENCEMENT OF COURSES

The regular three year course in the day division program commences only in September.

The regular four year course in the evening division program commences in September and also at the beginning of the second semester, in late January or early February.

September entrants will be offered the Schedule of Courses listed in this Catalogue, subject to possible current changes. The Courses to be offered to evening division classes entering in the second semester are announced each year in December. Special programs may be arranged upon consultation with the Registrar.

SEMESTER HOUR REQUIREMENTS

The academic year consists of two semesters, the First or Fall semester, commencing in September and the Second or Spring Semester, commencing in late January or early February.

The regular full-time day division three year course requires six semesters of fifteen semester hours each of class work.

The regular part-time evening division four year course requires eight semesters of nine semester hours each of class work.

The special part-time day division course requires credits for seventy-two semester hours of class work, computed on the basis of the semester hours allotted to the same courses in the evening division.

CLASS HOURS

All classes consist of 50 minute periods. Classes in the day division begin at 9 a.m., and end not later than 5 p.m. Classes in the evening division are conducted between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Class schedules are announced shortly before the commencement of each semester.

GRADUATE COURSES

The Graduate Division of Suffolk University Law School offers courses which are open to members of the Bar, law school graduates, and other persons qualified for participation by virtue of occupation, training or experience. Courses currently being offered are announced each semester in a Prospectus which may be obtained from the Registrar.

A program of study in such courses may be taken for credit towards the degree of Master of Laws by qualified law school graduates. Persons who wish to become candidates for the Master's degree should apply to the Registrar for an appointment for a personal interview with the Chairman of the Faculty Committee on Graduate Studies.

CURRICULUM

The development of a well rounded legal education demands a thorough training with special emphasis upon the fundamental branches of the law. There are other subjects, which, while important and valuable from the standpoint of information, are less vital to the understanding of basic principles or to the development of legal reasoning.

The undergraduate curriculum, accordingly, includes courses which all applicants for a degree are required to take and subjects among which a certain degree of election or choice is permitted.

DEAN'S LIST

Students whose weighted average is 83 or above are eligible for the Dean's List.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BACHELOR OF LAWS DEGREE

A candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Laws must comply with the following requirements:

- (a) Such candidate must have completed at least three years of full-time study in law school, of which at least the last year shall have been taken in Suffolk University Law School, or have completed at least four years of part-time study in law school, whether day or evening, of which at least the last year shall have been taken in Suffolk University Law School.
- (b) Such candidate must have obtained a general weighted average of at least 75 per cent, and have outstanding failures in no more than 6 semester hours in the full time division, and in no more than 5 semester hours in the part-time division.

Compliance with the foregoing requirements will not entitle a candidate, as of right, to the degree. Degrees are awarded by the Trustees of Suffolk University on recommendation by the Faculty Administrative Committee. Recommendation may be withheld by the Committee for cause other than scholastic deficiency.

HONORS

Students who have complied with all requirements for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, and whose scholastic achievement, in the judgment of the Faculty Administrative Committee, has been outstanding, may be recommended for the degree with honors.

REGULATIONS

1. Only students who can devote substantially all their working time to the study of law are eligible for admission to the three-year full-time day division program.
(See also *Regulations*, No. 8)
2. Students in course may not omit courses or examinations scheduled, or take courses or examinations not scheduled for their respective classes, except by prior permission of the Faculty Administrative Committee or the Dean.
3. A student out of course must obtain approval of his program of study by the Faculty Administrative Committee prior to registration.

4. Credit will not be given for courses taken in this or any other law school over five years prior to the date of current registration of the applicant therefor.
5. A student who fails to attend classes, to perform assignments or to take examinations may be dismissed from the Law School or placed on probation by the Faculty Administrative Committee.
6. A student who fails to meet the terms of probation may be dismissed from the Law School by the Faculty Administrative Committee.
7. A student who for any academic year has an average of less than 75 per cent, or a full-time day student who has failed in six or more semester hours in any academic year, or a part-time student who has failed in five or more semester hours in any academic year, may be dismissed from the Law School for scholastic deficiency by the Faculty Administrative Committee. If any such student is permitted to remain in the Law School he shall automatically be on probation, the terms of which shall be determined by the Faculty Administrative Committee.
8. A student who has been dismissed from the Law School for scholastic deficiency, who believes that there were extenuating circumstances beyond his control which establish that such deficiency was not due to his lack of ability or failure to apply himself diligently to the study of law, may as a matter of right file a written petition to the Faculty Administrative Committee for reinstatement, stating therein such facts specifically and fully. In the case of a student in the three-year full time day division program, outside employment does not constitute a ground for such petition. (*See Regulations, No. 1*)

Reinstatement and the terms thereof are in the discretion of the Faculty Administrative Committee.
9. A student on probation must obtain approval of his program of study by the Faculty Administrative Committee prior to registration.
10. A student who has received a passing grade of D or better in any course may not take a re-examination in that course.
11. A student who has failed to take the examination or who has received an F in any course or courses, and who has not been dis-

missed from the Law School or placed on probation, may take the next regular examination in the same division in such course or courses. A student may take only one re-examination in any course. A fee of \$5.00 is charged for each re-examination.

Failure to take such next examination in any course constitutes a waiver of the privilege with respect to that course unless authorized or excused by the Faculty Administrative Committee, and the student's grade for such course shall be finally recorded as F.

12. The Faculty Administrative Committee reserves the right to change the schedule of lectures, the program of instruction, the requirements for credits or degrees, and any rule or regulation established for the government of the student body in the School. Any such change may be made applicable to students already enrolled in the School.

FEEES

Application Fee:

An original application for admission to the University must be accompanied by an Application Fee of \$10.00. This fee is not a part of the tuition, and will not be refunded.

Re-examination Fee:

A fee of \$5.00 is charged for each re-examination.

Graduation Fee:

A Graduation Fee of \$20.00 is payable prior to Commencement.

TUITION

Tuition for the regular three year full-time course is \$350.00 per semester, or \$700.00 per year.

Tuition for the regular four year part-time evening course is \$250.00 per semester, or \$500.00 per year.

The charge for students taking other than a regular program is \$30.00 per semester hour.

These charges are subject to change by action of the Board of Trustees.

The tuition for each semester is due at the time of registration. However, students who find it necessary may arrange for a deferred tuition payment as follows: one-half of the tuition to be paid at the time of registration; one-fourth to be paid within one month after the opening date of the semester; and the final one-fourth to be paid within two months after the opening of the semester. Students who take advantage of the deferred payments will be required to pay \$5.00 in addition to the initial payment at the time of registration.

WITHDRAWALS AND REFUNDS

A student in good standing may withdraw from the Law School by a notice in writing effective upon delivery to the Registrar.

Partial refunding of tuition paid will be made proportionately in accordance with the following schedule based on payment of a full semester's tuition:

Withdrawal within:—	Tuition Refunded
One week of opening of semester	80%
Two weeks of opening of semester	60%
Three weeks of opening of semester	40%
Four weeks of opening of semester	20%

No refund will be made in case of withdrawal four weeks or more after the opening of the semester.

PLACEMENT OFFICE

The University maintains a placement office under the direction of a full time placement director. Its facilities are available to students and graduates of the Law School.

THE SUFFOLK LAW SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

This is a large and active organization of former students now on the Bench and at the Bar. Its Fall, Winter and Spring Dinners each year bring noted jurists, leading lawyers, and other distinguished speakers for addresses on current legal problems. It maintains the Alumni Fund from annual contributions of its members. This Fund furnishes generous support for scholarships, library acquisitions, and other needs of the Law School.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

(All courses are listed in terms of the semester hour credit given in the full-time Day Division.)

Administrative Law. Professor Donahue Three Hours

A study of the organization, function and procedures of state and federal administrative agencies, including the investigatory, rule-making, adjudicatory and enforcement functions of such agencies, and judicial review of administrative action. Consideration will be given to the Massachusetts and the Federal Administrative Procedure Acts.

Gellhorn and Byse, *Administrative Law — Cases and Comments*, 1954

Agency. Professors Donahue and Sargent Two Hours

Nature of the agency relation; master and servant; independent contractor; the agent's authority; formalities; nature and extent of the agent's authority, actual and apparent; parties — disclosed, partially disclosed, and undisclosed principal; unauthorized transactions; notice; ratification; termination; principal's right to diligence and fidelity; agent's rights against principal. Mechem, *Cases on Agency*, 4th Ed.

Bankruptcy and Creditor's Rights. Two Hours

Assignments for the benefit of creditors; the Federal Bankruptcy Act as amended to date; rights of bankrupts and creditors; the bankrupt estate and its distribution; reorganization of corporations under the act; bankruptcy procedure.

Bills and Notes. Professors Parke and O'Brien Three Hours

Law merchant basis of subject; assignability and negotiability; formal requisites of negotiable bills and notes; nature of original obligations of all parties; principles of negotiation; rights of holders and of other transferees; warranties; presentment and notice of dishonor; rights of action upon negotiable instruments and defenses real and personal; the effect of the Uniform Commercial Code.

Aigler, *Cases on Bills and Notes*, 2nd Ed.

Business Associations. Professor O'Donohue Four Hours

Formation, operation and dissolution of partnerships and unincorporated associations; rights and obligations of members and creditors. Formation, management and dissolution of corporations: rights, duties and liabilities of promoters, stockholders, directors and creditors.

Crane, *Partnership*; Baker and Cary, *Cases on Corporations*

Conflict of Laws. Professor Donahue Three Hours

General principles; domicile; jurisdiction; judgments; full faith and credit; res judicata; federal courts; foreign courts; corporations; contracts and conveyances; tort obligations and workmen's compensation; procedure; probate of estates; taxation; marriage and divorce; custody; legitimacy and adoption.

Stumberg, *Cases on Conflicts*

Constitutional Law. Professor Canavan Three Hours

Analysis of selected decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States in the field of Constitutional Law, with special attention to the major problems of federalism and constitutional limitations in favor of individual liberty and private property. Commerce; police power; taxation.

McGovney and Howard, *Cases on Constitutional Law*, 3rd Ed.

Contracts. Professors O'Brien and Baldes Six Hours

Contracts defined and classified; capacity of parties; nature and legal effect of offer and acceptance; consideration; types of consideration; fraud, mistake and undue influence; statute of frauds; types of illegal contracts; effect of illegality; interpretation of language; operation of contracts; assignment by acts of parties and by operation of law; effect of express and implied conditions; performance of conditions; waiver of conditions; rescission of contracts; performance; excuses for non-performance, including novation, alteration and impossibility of performance; breach of contract and remedies therefor; damages, nominal and compensatory; quasi-contracts.

Corbin, *Cases on Contracts*

Conveyancing. Professors Nolan and Getchell Two Hours

Real estate purchase and sale agreements; forms and essentials of deeds; mortgages, including extension, assignment, discharge, redemption and foreclosure; easements, profits, covenants, restrictions and servitudes; tax and other liens; registered land; examination of title and passing papers on sale of mortgaged land.

Casner and Leach, *Cases and Text on Property*;

Partridge, *Deeds, Mortgages and Easements*

Criminal Law. Professor Flynn Three Hours

General principles; sources of criminal law; criminal intent; jurisdiction of courts to punish crimes; defenses open to persons accused of crime; classification of crimes and criminals; homicide, justifiable and

felonious; murder in various degrees; manslaughter; rape; robbery; burglary; arson; mayhem; affray; assault; larceny, common law and statutory; embezzlement; false pretenses; forgery; conspiracy; bribery; perjury; contempt of court; libel; polygamy and sexual offenses; court procedure; arrest, commitment, arraignment; trial and sentence.

Flynn, *Cases on Criminal Law*

Domestic Relations. Professor Lombard Two Hours

Marriage and marital relations; engagements to marry; marriage at common law and under statutes; antenuptial and postnuptial settlements; separate support; annulling and affirming marriage; rights of husband and wife; duties regarding children; limitations as to contractual rights between husband and wife; divorce in general; grounds of divorce; defenses in divorce; vacating decrees of divorce; alimony; custody and maintenance of minor children; parent and child, rights, duties, and liabilities of each; effect of domestic and foreign divorces; separation by agreement; venue and domicile; legitimacy, illegitimacy and adoption.

Compton, *Cases on Domestic Relations*

Drafting of Legal Instruments. Professor Parke Two Hours

Purpose and scope: This course is planned to cultivate in seniors the faculty of accurate analysis of (1) the essential facts involved in various problems arising in practice, (2) the bearing upon such facts of the relevant law, and (3) the precise expression in writing of the result of correct analysis of facts and of the applicable law.

Subject matter; deeds, mortgages of realty and personal property, leases of land and chattels, contracts of sale of land and chattels; bills, notes and other commercial instruments; formation of a partnership, business corporation, Massachusetts trust; power of attorney; bonds and other suretyship obligations.

Equity. Professor Fenton Four Hours

History, jurisdiction and powers of equity courts; the adequacy of the remedy at law; injunctive relief against injuries to land, business, personality, and to social, domestic and political relations; specific performance of affirmative and negative contracts; defenses of laches, unclean hands, misrepresentation, mistake and hardship; reformation and rescission; equitable servitudes; equitable conversion.

Equity Practice. Professor L. A. Reed Two Hours

Jurisdiction and venue; parties to the suit; essentials of the bill of complaint; creditors' bills; fraudulent conveyances; demurrers; pleas; answers; master's report; findings; decrees — preliminary, interlocutory and final.

Estate, Inheritance, and Gift Taxation. Messrs. Sullivan and Dever Two Hours

Tax consequences of testamentary and inter vivos gifts, outright and in trust; preparation of estate, inheritance and gift tax returns; tax problems of the executor, administrator and trustee. *Selected Materials*

Estate Planning. Mr. Linsley Two Hours

An examination and integration of the use of inter vivos gifts, revocable and irrevocable trusts, forms of concurrent ownership, powers of appointment, insurance, the will and testamentary trusts as factors in estate planning; consideration of the impact of gift, income, estate and inheritance taxes; powers, duties and problems of the fiduciary.

Evidence. Dean McDermott Five Hours

Law and fact, functions of the judge and the jury; testimonial, circumstantial, and real evidence; relevancy, competency and privilege; writings; examination of witnesses; offer of evidence, exceptions and review of questions of law and fact. Morgan, Maguire and Weinstein,
Cases and Materials on Evidence, 4th Ed.

Federal Courts. Professor O'Brien Three Hours

Law applicable in Federal Courts; jurisdiction; commencement of action; pleadings; remedies and appeals; rules of civil procedure; rules of criminal procedure.

Forrester, *Federal Jurisdiction and Procedure*, 2nd Ed.

Fiduciary Administration. Mr. Linsley Two Hours

Court procedures and practical problems involved in the administration of all types of estates, from guardianship of minors to trusts, both inter vivos and testamentary; elements of competent draftsmanship in the field of wills and trusts; an informed approach to the problems of estate planning.

Simes & Fratcher, *Cases and Materials on Fiduciary Administration*, 2nd Ed.

Future Interests. Professor Nolan Two Hours

Reversions, remainders and executory interests at common law and under modern legislation. The creation and execution of powers of appointment. The construction of limitations, particularly of class gifts. The nature and application of the rule against remotely contingent interests, and related rules.

Insurance. Two Hours

Regulation of insurance business; insurable interest; the insurance contract; the interests protected by contracts of insurance; construction of policies; rights under policies; rights by subrogation.

Jurisdiction and Judgments. Professor Fenton Two Hours

A study of the jurisdiction of state and federal courts, original and appellate; venue and change of venue; the territorial extent of jurisdiction; the invoking of original jurisdiction; conclusiveness of and attacks upon judgments.

Jurisprudence. Professor J. J. Hurley Two Hours

Examination of the major schools of legal philosophy and consideration of some major current legal problems from a jurisprudential point of view.

Fuller, *The Problems of Jurisprudence*

Labor Law. Professor Kowal Two Hours

The growth of the labor movement; the labor injunction — picketing; the Clayton Act; the Norris-LaGuardia Act; the Taft-Hartley Act; the collective bargaining relationship; scope of the NLRA; methods of the NLRB; the individual and the union.

Cox, *Cases on Labor Law*, 4th Ed.

Landlord and Tenant. Professor Nolan Two Hours

Relation between landlord and tenant; use and occupation; implied and express tenancies; agreements for lease; tenancies for years, from year to year, at will, at sufferance; termination of tenancies; summary process; rights and liabilities of landlord and tenant; rights of third persons against landlord, against tenant.

Simpson, *Cases on Landlord and Tenant*

Legal Accounting. Professor O'Brien Two Hours

Principles, terminology and procedures of accounting; journals, ledgers, trial balances, adjustments for deferred and accrued items, controlling accounts and closing entries; evaluation of balance sheet, profit and loss, and other financial statements; types of stock and bond contracts, reserves, sinking funds, depreciation, surplus, merchandising and manufacturing accounts.

Legal Method. Professor Donahue; Professors Fenton, Sargent and J. J. Hurley, Messrs. J. M. Reed, Goewey and Ryan Two Hours

An introduction to the study of law, which acquaints the beginning student with the Canons of Legal Ethics, and is designed to train him in analysis and synthesis of cases and other legal materials, and in the methods of legal research. Classes are broken down into small groups which are given individual attention, and the course is conducted on a seminar basis. Each student is required to submit written abstracts and legal memoranda on problems involving questions of substantive law, procedure and legal ethics.

Municipal Corporations. Professor Archer Two Hours

Nature, functions, limitations and controls; cities and towns, powers and duties; officers and employees; ordinances and by-laws; streets, sewers, municipal utilities; contracts and torts; appropriations; taxation and special assessments; public schools.

Fordham, *Cases on Local Government Law*

Personal Property. Professor Nolan Two Hours

Nature of personal property; possession; rights of a finder; bailments; common law, statutory, contractual and equitable liens; pledges; acquisition of ownership of personal property by accession and confusion; gifts; fixtures and emblements.

Casner and Leach, *Cases and Text on Property*

Practice and Procedure. Professor Parke Two Hours

This course, dealing particularly with Massachusetts practice, includes consideration of the following: jurisdiction of the various courts; venue; forms, substance and service of writs including attachments and arrest; the various kinds of action at law; parties; declarations; motions to dismiss, answers in abatement, demurrers, answers to the merits; amendments, interrogatories; notice to admit facts; proceedings before auditors and masters; exceptions; appeals; report procedure in district and superior courts; judgment and execution; extraordinary writs.

Public Utilities. Two Hours

Activities regarded as public utilities; history of regulation; purposes of regulation; power to regulate — constitutional limitations; state and federal statutes; regulation by commission; specific utilities regulated; competition and control of monopoly; certificates of public convenience and necessity; restraining unauthorized competition; suspension and abandonment of services and facilities; expansion of facilities; duty to serve and excuses; rate regulation and rate making; discrimination and preferences; liability.

Real Property. Professor Nolan Three Hours

Concept of possession; historical development of land law; estates; ownership; modes of transferring title; recording of title papers; title registration; fixtures; easements; licenses; rights to lateral and subjacent support; water rights.

Remedies. Professor Fenton Four Hours

Development of the English courts and the common law remedies; trespass, case, trover, detinue, replevin, debt, covenant and assumpsit. Judicial organization and remedies under modern American statutes. Jurisdiction of the action, the parties and the property. Venue, process and writs; pleadings and procedure.

Sales. Professors Parke and O'Brien Three Hours

Sale contract defined; sale of specific goods; contracts to sell unspecified goods, subsequent appropriation; risk of loss; conditional sales; rights of unpaid seller; rights of third persons as affected by want of delivery

or retention of possession by seller; warranties; bills of lading, warehouse receipts, trust receipts; rights and liabilities of parties in cases of breach of contract; statute of frauds; the effect of the Uniform Commercial Code. McCurdy, *Sales Transactions*

Security. Professor Parke Four Hours

Nature of the contracts of guarantor and of surety; statute of frauds in relation to guaranty; the defences of the surety against the creditor; the rights of the surety before and after payment against creditor, principal debtor, cosurety; subrogation, reimbursement, contribution, exoneration, marshalling. Various kinds of bonds. Nature of mortgages and pledges of personal property; rights of mortgagor, mortgagee, pledgor and pledgee, attaching creditors. Nature of real estate mortgages; recording statutes; foreclosure and redemption; suits for deficiency; surplus; assignment and discharge; actions and defences in cases of non-negotiable and negotiable obligations secured by real estate mortgages. Extension, subrogation, contribution, exoneration, marshalling. The effect of the Uniform Commercial Code.

Seminar. Professor O'Brien; Messrs. Reed and Goewey Two Hours

Class analysis and discussion of a series of complicated fact situations selected to develop a lawyer-like approach to legal problems involving the interplay of principles of various fields of substantive law and the choice of procedural remedies. To the extent that time permits, practice in the writing of legal memoranda will also be afforded.

Taxation. Messrs. Riley and Browne Four Hours

Federal income tax, gross income, deductions, taxable income, gains and losses, corporations, partnerships, estates and trusts, preparation and filing of returns, payments, deficiencies, refunds, procedural questions. Gift and estate taxes. Surrey and Warren, *Federal Income Taxation*; Griswold, *Cases on Federal Taxation*

Torts. Professors J. L. Hurley and Sargent Six Hours

Torts defined; who may be liable; extent of liability; defenses; assault and battery; false imprisonment; slander and libel; alienation and seduction; torts against property and property rights; deceit; unfair competition; infringement of patents and copyrights; interference with contracts; violation of rights to support of land; violation of water

rights; trespass to property; conversion; nuisance; waste; malicious prosecution; abuse of process and unwarranted arrest and attachment; the law of negligence — degrees of negligence; function of court and jury; *res ipsa loquitur*; violation of statute; automobile law; compulsory insurance; cause and condition; standards of care; employer and employee; contributory negligence; imputed negligence.

Trusts. Professor Sargent

Three Hours

Trusts defined and classified; trusts and other relationships distinguished; express, resulting and constructive trusts; interpretation of trust instrument; appointment and powers of trustees; rights and liabilities of trustees and beneficiaries; charitable trusts, origin and development; charities and the rule against perpetuities; *cy-pres* doctrine; powers and duties of trustees; trustees' liability on contracts and for torts; principal and income accounts; remedies under trusts; termination of trusts.

Wills and Probate. Professors Getchell and Cotter Two Hours

The legal essentials of the execution, amendment, and revocation of wills; construction of wills; mistake, misnomer and misdescription in wills; bases for contest of wills; laws of intestate succession; laws for protection of widows, natural born and adopted children; effects of divorce and legal separation; probate of wills and intestate estates.

Leach, *Cases on Wills*

Workmen's Compensation Law and Rights of Injured Workers.

Two Hours

The course will deal mainly with the workmen's compensation law with special reference to Massachusetts; it will also cover the allied subjects of the rights of injured workers under railroad, admiralty, and tort law.
