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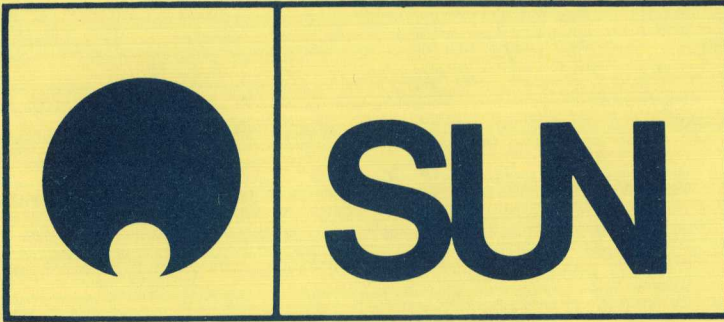

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PRESIDENT FULHAM INSTALLED IN COLORFUL CEREMONY ANNOUNCES S.U. ACQUISITION OF NEW BUILDING

In a colorfully unique ceremony, witnessed by nearly 1000 guests, Thomas Anthony Fulham was installed as Suffolk's sixth president on September 26.

Temple and Derne Streets were blocked off to traffic as guests viewed the ceremony from folding chairs which stretched nearly half the length of Temple Street. Adding to the flavor of the outdoor program, conducted in ideal weather, was the appearance of the Boston Fire Department Band.

President Fulham, in his inaugural response, pledged to continue Suffolk's tradition of providing an excellent education for all qualified applicants. He also disclosed that Suffolk and the Massachusetts Teachers Association had reached "substantial agreement" for Suffolk to acquire the eight-story building at 20 Ashburton Place, an edifice only three years old.

The announcement was greeted by applause from faculty members and students in attendance.

President Fulham was installed by Judge John E. Fenton, chairman of the board of trustees. Judge Fenton placed the "insignia of office," a brilliant chained silver medallion about the neck of Fulham to mark the official investiture.

Among the platform speakers were Lt. Governor Donald R. Dwight, representing the Commonwealth, and Mayor Kevin H. White bringing the greetings of the City and commenting that "I've never seen a city street in Boston put to better use."

Representatives from nearly 80 colleges and universities and learned societies attended the installation in academic attire as did Suffolk faculty and trustees.

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Sister Mary Vianney Fulham, president of Mount Saint Mary College, Hooksett, N.H., sister of President Fulham, delivered the keynote address and described her brother as a man who "loves the philosophic quest."

Welcoming and tribute to the new president also came from Superior Court Judge Eugene A. Hudson, vice president of the board of trustees, who spoke for Judge Frank J. Donahue, a life trustee, who was ailing on the day of the installation; retired Dean and Vice President Donald W. Goodrich, on behalf of the faculty; Neal D. Hannon, president of the General Alumni Association; Joseph B. Shanahan, president of the Student Government Association; and John C. Deliso, president of the Student Bar Association.

THE NEW BUILDING - WHAT IT MEANS

Suffolk's family has responded enthusiastically to the news that the university has reached agreement with the Massachusetts Teachers Association to acquire the building on 20 Ashburton Place.

However, President Fulham stresses that his announcement at the inauguration contained the words "substantial agreement." The actual transaction has not been completed, and it could be several months before Suffolk can occupy any part of the eight-story building.

In the meantime, the President has requested all personnel to refrain from visiting the site until the university has taken actual possession of the property.

Tentative plans call for the building to be used to house Suffolk's college of liberal arts, but of course this could be subject to change pending further studies.

The university hopes to take occupancy "floor by floor" since leasing arrangements with present tenants could delay total occupancy for as long as six years. It is hoped that several floors will be available within a year.

Acquisition of the three-year old building with its convenient location marks another step forward in Suffolk's development. It will ease congestion and offer the university an attractive additional face.

As President Fulham remarked at his inauguration, "We feel that the acquisition of this building, which contains approximately 51,000 square feet of floor space, will greatly alleviate the space problem plaguing Suffolk as a result of its rapid growth in enrollment.

COLLEGE ENROLLMENT INCREASED BY 318 STUDENTS

Suffolk University total enrollment in its college divisions now stands at 3773, an increase of 318 students from the fall of 1970, according to official figures in the office of Registrar Mary A. Hefron.

The statistics show an increase in every class in both day and evening divisions except sophomore day, which showed a decline of 48 students, and day graduate division, a decrease of 9. The total includes 2110 day students and 1663 evening students. A year ago, 1960 day students and 1495 evening students were enrolled.

Biggest increases came in the junior and senior classes in the day division, reflecting the impact of transfer students. The junior class has jumped from 552 to 640 while the senior class has increased from 447 to 538 students.

Miss Hefron noted a sizeable increase in the college of journalism, which now numbers 133 day students and 17 evening candidates.

Extension programs at Western Electric Company in North Andover, and at Hingham High School also have attracted good enrollments. Approximately 85 persons are enrolled in graduate programs in physics and business administration and an undergraduate program in business administration at Western Electric. About 25 have signed up for a graduate education course at Hingham.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE PLANS FACULTY RECEPTIONS

The Suffolk Faculty Social Committee is alive and well again and aiming to stay that way.

As evidence of its intention to promote and foster cordial relations among faculty and administrators, the committee will hold two separate cocktail receptions in the school cafeteria in November.

Full and part-time faculty members, members of the administration and trustees will be invited along with spouses to the receptions, which will be held on the Sundays of November 14 and November 21 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Plans call for the invitations to be sent in alphabetical groupings. Those whose last names begin with initials A-L will attend the first reception, and those with the initials M-Z will be invited to the November 21 gathering.

Dr. Ilse M. Fang, assistant professor of modern languages, is chairman of the social committee. "We hope to promote cordial relations among Suffolk's faculty, particularly those who don't know each other that well, and for many of our new faculty," Dr. Fang reported. "In addition, this will give the spouses of faculty and administrators the opportunity to meet one another as well as to see our university and recognize its development.

Also serving on the committee are John V. Colburn, associate professor of English, Mrs. Mary M. Mahoney, assistant professor of psychological services, James E. Nelson, physical education instructor, and John W. White, associate professor of education.

ATTORNEY GENERAL QUINN TO SPEAK AT S.U. ON OCTOBER 19

Attorney General Robert H. Quinn will be the speaker in the second session of a fall series on consumer business relations at Suffolk Auditorium, October 19 at 2:30 p.m.

The series, sponsored by Suffolk's College of Business Administration and the Better Business Bureau of Eastern Massachusetts, got off to a successful start when it opened on September 30. Dr. Colston E. Warne, president of Consumers Union, addressed an audience of several hundred in the auditorium. The address followed a press conference in the President's Conference Room.

Atty. General Quinn has been recognized widely for his efforts on behalf of Massachusetts consumers. His Consumer Protection Division has worked diligently on behalf of the consumer.

Dean Robert C. Waehler, through whose efforts Suffolk became involved in the series, said he was pleased by the response from students and people from the outside world.

"This first session generated considerable interest and we feel that the response will be even greater for the upcoming sessions now that attention has been focused on this important subject," Waehler said.

RE-ACCREDITATION SELF-EVALUATION STUDY MEETINGS SCHEDULED

Two meetings have already been held in connection with the self-evaluation study in preparation for the upcoming re-accreditation by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Dean Joseph H. Strain of the evening division and summer sessions chaired an interesting opening meeting, reception and dinner on September 28. A planning committee meeting was held on October 12 and a second planning committee meeting is scheduled for October 26 at 1 p.m. in the President's Conference Room.

Forty-two members of the faculty and administration attended the initial organizational meeting at which Suffolk's objectives were discussed. Other matters taken up were statistical data; importance of student views; university growth and development; administrative data; salary structure; and university governance under the 1962 NEACSS evaluating committee recommendation.
