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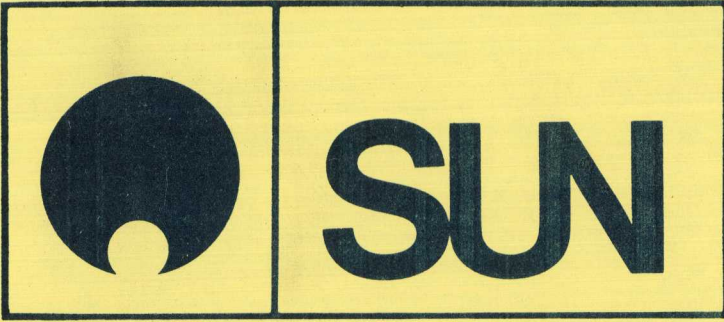

### JOURNALISM DEPARTMENT PLANS HIGH SCHOOL COMPETITION

Suffolk's Journalism Department is sponsoring its second annual high school newspaper competition for Greater Boston students. Invitations have been sent out to some 110 high schools in the area, Malcolm J. Barach, chairman of the department, announced.

Three scholarships, totaling \$3000, will be awarded at a luncheon to be held at Suffolk on March 16. A minimum of two issues must be submitted and the deadline for entries is January 21. Scholarship awards will be presented in three categories: excellence in news writing, \$1400; excellence in editorial writing, \$1000; excellence in typography, \$600.

At last year's luncheon, awards were presented to Malden High School, Revere High School and Medford High School.

In another development affecting the journalism department, the board of trustees has approved a proposal for a combined English and Journalism major, beginning with the September, 1972 semester. The major will prepare such majors to teach English and Journalism on the high school level. The major, leading to a bachelor of arts, calls for 122 hours credit (including 24 English, 18 Journalism) with a minor in secondary education.

Purpose of the combined major is to enable journalism-prepared teachers to act as advisors to student publications and to teach Journalism courses in high school.



## SOCIOLOGY DEPARTMENT LISTS DRUG COURSE

Suffolk's Sociology Department, encouraged by the success of last Spring's drug institute, is offering a follow-up expanded course, entitled Drug and American Society, for three semester hours credit beginning with the Spring semester.

The course will be given on Saturdays from 9 to 11:40 a.m. over a 15-week period starting January 29 and concluding May 6. An examination will be given on Saturday, May 13.

Gary Castanino, visiting assistant professor of Sociology, is coordinator. "The structure and content of the course will be similar to the institute we sponsored with the Attorney General's Office last Spring," Castanino said. "This year, however, we have made it a course and there will be three hours credit. In addition, we have expanded and varied the format."

Castanino said the course will include workshops, lectures and films featuring noted professional and service personnel. The course may be used toward a major in Sociology or as an elective. The charge is \$120, normal tuition fee. Non-credit participation costs \$50.

Cooperating in the program are the Attorney General's Office and the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health. Working closely with Castanino is Ben Ross, chief coordinator of the Standard and Licensing in the division of Drug Rehabilitation, Department of Mental Health. Ross received a master of arts in education from Suffolk in 1954.

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## SENATOR PROXMIRE SPEAKS TO LAW STUDENTS

Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin made a special address to Suffolk University Law students on Thursday night, December 9. The liberal Democrat caught an early evening flight to Boston and arrived at the school shortly before 8 p.m.

Proxmire addressed the Student Bar Association for approximately an hour, and included a question and answer period. The senator had been delayed on the Senate floor by a pressing tax bill. A day before his appearance at Suffolk, he had announced his support of Supreme Court nominee William H. Rehnquist.

Proxmire was greeted by television and newsmen at the Suffolk Auditorium and immediately questioned about the Rehnquist appointment. Later, he reiterated his support of Rehnquist in answer to a law school student's question. He noted that he was in favor of the Rehnquist nomination even though all but one of his 15-member staff opposed it.

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## MODERN LANGUAGE CLUB HOLDS DURER EXHIBIT

The Modern Language Club presented an exhibit of the German artist, Elbrecht Durer in the lobby of the Donahue Building on Tuesday, December 14 to mark the 500th birthday of the unsurpassed European print maker.

It was based on a German travel exhibit of his prints, and samples of his other media were exhibited on the second and third floor corridors and in the college library.

A highlight of the exhibit was a guided tour by Dr. Anneliese Harding, German-trained art historian, who previously had spoken to a Suffolk group on Ernst Barlach. A reception for Dr. Harding in the President's Conference Room followed.

Dr. Ilse Fang, assistant professor of modern languages, praised the work of the Modern Language Club and cited the following for their efforts: Nanci Gratan, Marsalie Hutchinson, Joanna Jackson, Peggy Bogus, Hannelore Gresser and Michael Colpoys. Dr. Fang also announced plans for a Modern Language Club exhibit of 20th century art of all Western Europe at a later time.

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## DEAN GRUNEWALD INVITED TO 'WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE'

Dr. Donald Grunewald, vice president and dean of the college of arts and sciences, has been invited to the White House Conference on the Industrial World Ahead to be held February 7-9 at the Sheraton-Park Hotel, Washington, D.C.

President Nixon called the conference, entitled "A Look at Business in 1990," recognizing that man "must become the manager of change." Leaders from business, labor, education and government from throughout the nation were invited to attend the three-day parley. President Nixon will deliver an address at the banquet the evening of February 7.

The conference will be chaired by Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans and Secretary of Labor James D. Hodgson.

Dean Grunewald was dean of Suffolk's college of business administration before succeeding Donald W. Goodrich as vice president and dean of the college of arts and sciences in July of 1969. He is a graduate of Union College, Harvard Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, and holds both a master of business administration and a doctor of business administration from the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration. He is the author of several books and publications on business and management.
