Dr. Martin Luther King Here Sunday

Long May It Wave!



Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., outstanding Negro leader, and clergyman will speak on "Facing the Challenge of a New Age," Sunday, April 20, at 10:30 a.m.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

at the Community Church of Boston, Conservatory Auditorium, 31 Hemenway st.

Dr. King, minister of the Dexter ave., Baptist Church and president of the Montgomery, Alabama Improvement Association has received more than forty awards for his leadership in the Montgomery Movement for racial equity. Gallup Poll revealed that he is one of the most admired leaders in the world, and Time Magazine listed him as one of the most outstanding personalities of 1957. He is a graduate of Morehouse College and Crozer Theological Seminary. In 1955 he received his Ph.D. from Boston University. In 1957 he received a Doctor of Humane Letters from Morehouse, a Doctor of Divinity from the University of Chicago, and a Doctor of Laws from Howard University.

The service will be conducted by the minister, Rev. Donald G. Leighton.

The Community Church has since its birth been an interracial church as well as non-sectarian, and Negro members have served on its committees, its Board of Directors, and two of its presidents have been Negroes.

KENNEDY PUSHES AID TO INDIA

Washington — In the U. S. Senate Tuesday, March 25, Senator John F. Kennedy (Mass., Democrat), for himself and Senator John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky, submitted the following concurrent resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations:

Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), that the Congress recognize the importance of the economic development of the Republic of India, and that it be the policy of the United States to support such development.

Federation Fete To Draw Hundreds

Climaxing Boston's celebration of the complete launching of the newest self-governing member of the British Commonwealth of Nations, the West Indies Federation, will be the banquet-ball at the Hotel Sheraton-Plaza next Tuesday evening, April 22. On the same day, in Trinidad, B.W.I., Her Royal Highness the Princess Margaret, sister of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, will inaugurate the Federal Parliament.

Similar celebrations will be held in every State in the Union.

All indications are that the event will be memorable in Boston's history, for more than 900 persons are expected to attend, according to the West Indian Federation Celebration Committee, under the sponsorship of the Barbados Mutual Society, Jamaican

Associates, and the Montserrat Progressive Benevolent Society.

Fred W. Jandrey of the U.S. Department of State will represent the U.S. Government, after the evening's program gets under way with incidental orchestral music and the singing of the national anthems of the United States. "The Star Spangled Banner," and of Britain, "God Save the Queen," by the Shaw House chorus, directed by Darnley L. Corbin, with Miss Juanita Sims, pianist.

Rev. Walter C. Davis, president of the Ministerial Alliance of Greater Boston and pastor at Charles B. A. M. E. Church, Roxbury, will offer the invocation. The address of welcome will be delivered by Lionel O. Lindsay co-chairman, who will introduce the master of ceremonies, Commissioner Victor C. Bynoe.

EXPLORER MODEL AT SCIENCE MUSEUM

A model of America's first successful earth satellite, the Explorer I, has just been put on display at Boston's Museum of Science.

The seven foot plus model, along with a drawing of the Jupiter C rocket that thrust the Explorer into outer space is part of the Museum's extensive exhibit explaining this country's rocket-satellite program under the International Geographical Year. A scale model of the Jupiter C is being readied and will shortly be displayed.

Ward Cruikshank II of Marblehead, director of exhibits, says that as new satellites are shot into orbit, they will be recreated for Museum visitors, who have evidenced keen interest in space exhibits ever since Sputnik took to the skies last Fall.

The IQY exhibit also shows the location of moonwatch optical and radio tracking stations, a simulated launching platform and an actual moonwatch telescope. Demonstrations of how rockets and satellites work and how they stay in space are given daily, except Mondays from the second floor of the East Wing.

The Museum is open Tuesdays through Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m. There is ample free parking.
